HI TIP: Together In Prayer

Each month we focus on a local community concern and ask parishioners to commit to praying for 2 minutes each day specifically for that concern as well as for our church community. You can pray whenever and wherever you want. "Ask and you will receive" said Jesus. Together we can do great things.

BAPTISMS

The celebration of the Sacrament of Baptism for infants is scheduled after the baptismal preparation for the parents are completed. Baptisms are normally celebrated at a Sunday Mass in the parish where the parents live. Adults (7-years or older) seeking baptism or confirmation are invited to inquire at the parish office for information about adult preparation.

MARRIAGE

Couples seeking marriage in the Church are asked to contact the parish at least four months in advance of their proposed wedding date. For those with prior marriages, additional time may be required. Marriages are celebrated in the parish in which one of the Catholic parties lives.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION (CONFESSION)

Private confession is available on the 1st Sunday of the month between the 8 am and 10:30 am Masses. Confession is available on Saturdays at St. Jude's in Redmond from 4 to 4:30 pm. There are also communal reconciliation services with private confession during Advent and Lent. Fr. Heric is also available by appointment.

PASTORAL CARE FOR THE SICK & DYING

In the case of serious illness or failing health due to old age, parishioners should ask the church for the Sacrament of Anointing. This sacrament is administered by a priest and is best celebrated communally at a Sunday Mass, but may be offered individually by appointment as necessary. When a parishioner is near death, they should receive Holy Communion, called the Sacrament of Viaticum (*food for the journey*). This sacrament can be administered by a priest, deacon, or a eucharistic minister.



Violence Begins

A number of our young people preparing for Confirmation were deeply wounded and shocked by the Christmas Eve slaying of their Woodinville High teacher, Prudence Hockley. We do not have to look very far before we know someone grieving as the result of violence. Many of us have been deeply saddened by the murder of the Mt. Rainier National Park Ranger, Margaret Anderson. It is believed that her presumed killer, Benjamin Barnes, was affected by Post Traumatic Stress disorder stemming from his service in Iraq. He is also suspected in the shooting of four other people that day.

Much of this we have all read or seen in the news. We search our hearts, we pray, and many of us experience a numbing that goes deep into our souls. First of all, our hearts and prayers go out to the victims. We also need to pray for their slayers. And, very importantly, we need to let God's transforming love touch each of our hearts. We desperately need to become more people of peace in order that peace may grow in our world.

HOW DO WE LIVE DISCIPLESHIP?

The call to discipleship is a call to a personal relationship with Jesus that will fill you so deeply that you desire to give everything back to Jesus. This is a relationship that captures our attention and our intentions! It takes time and as we say, practice to be a disciple. (relationships always do) Of course, there are things we must do as his disciples.

Jesus has told us to obey his commandments. He told us the greatest Commandment is to **Love God above All Things and to love your neighbor as yourself.** So, turning our hearts to him during a busy day or going out of our way to help some one, becomes a part of our everyday lives.

As a disciple, how can you respond to Jesus out of love today? How can you serve Jesus by caring for others? The Catholic Church tells us that part of how we live out our Discipleship is through the **Corporal Works of Mercy** which include: Feed the Hungry, Give Drink to the Thirsty, Clothe the Naked, Shelter the Homeless, Visit the Sick and Visit the Prisoners and Bury the Dead.

The **Spiritual Works of Mercy** which include: Help others do what is right, Teach the uneducated, Give advice to the doubtful, Comfort those who suffer, Be patient with others, Forgive injuries and Pray for the living and the dead. As most of us are aware, as a parish community, we all share in the support of a number of ministries that touch on these very acts of Mercy. But how do we focus on a few when there are so many options?

Part of what helps to give direction to a community is a Parish Mission Statement. A Parish Mission Statement is a concise expression of a parish's purpose for existence. It helps the parish identify itself as a community of faith and set broad goals. It responds to the questions: Who are we as a parish? What do we value? What do we seek to become as a parish community? The Parish Mission Statement is rooted in the mission of the universal church and the Archdiocesan Mission Statement. Over the next couple of weeks we will reflect on Holy Innocents own mission statement and how we as Disciples can be inspired to live and practice our faith.

Haiti, Two-Years On: Real Progress, Led by Haitian Communities

The recovery from the January 12, 2010 quake is ongoing.
